

29A PR TS (08 05 24) - Temporary Suspension of Property UW Authority - Hurricane Debby (Regions Expanded)

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Please note the following <u>expansion</u> of Regions applicable to the Temporary Suspension of Property Underwriting Authority related to Hurricane Debby (previously referred to as Tropical Cyclone Four in Bulletin #29).

Effective immediately, for the <u>revised</u> territories identified below, there is a moratorium on any new business. Additionally, for any exposures in the moratorium area on renewals or existing business, underwriters:

- 1. Cannot increase limits.
- 2. Cannot add new locations.
- 3. Cannot make any changes that broaden existing coverage or lower deductibles.

 - 1. The State of Florida
 - 2. The State of Georgia Counties of Bryan, Camden, Chatham, Glynn, Liberty, McIntosh, Brantley, Wayne, Long, Tattnall, Evans, Bulloch, Effingham, Screven, Appling, Pierce
 - 3. The State of South Carolina Counties of Beaufort, Berkeley, Charleston, Colleton, Georgetown, Horry, Jasper, Dorchester, Hampton, Williamsburg
 - 4. The State of North Carolina Counties of Beaufort, Brunswick, Camden, Carteret, Chowan, Craven, Currituck, Dare, Hyde, Jones, New Hanover, Onslow, Pamlico, Pender, Perquimans, Pasquotank, Tyrrell, Washington

Hurricane Debby

2. Event Details:


- 1. Hurricane Debby made landfall as a Category 1 hurricane near Steinhatchee, Taylor County, Florida at around 11:00 UTC (07:00 local time) on Monday August 5. At landfall, the system had maximum sustained wind speeds of 80 mph (130 km/hr) and a central pressure of 979 hPa.
- 2. Debby is bringing hurricane-force winds, life-threatening storm surge, and heavy rainfall to portions of Florida's Big Bend region and Gulf coast. Widespread flooding and extensive damage to infrastructure, including to power and communications, has already been reported.
- 3. The center of Debby is expected to move into northern Florida in the coming hours and is expected to weaken back to tropical storm intensity later today, Monday August 5, before crossing southeast Georgia tomorrow, Tuesday August 6.
- 4. Potentially historic heavy rainfall is possible across southeast Georgia and South Carolina as the system re-emerges into the North Atlantic on Tuesday August 6 and stalls near the coast for several days as a tropical storm.
